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School Mission Statement

Admissions, Instruction, and Curriculum

Goals and Values

The goal of our preschool is to provide a Christian atmosphere in which children are given the opportunities to:

- Form a close relationship with God
- Enhance their understanding of self
- Learn to work cooperatively with others
- Develop their intellectual and physical development

We value and are committed to:

- Respecting the dignity, worth, and uniqueness of each person
- Appreciating childhood as a unique and valuable stage of the human life cycle
- Basing our work on knowledge of child development
- Valuing children's play as their means of translating experiences into understanding
- Appreciating and supporting close ties between the child and family
- Helping parents locate resources that will aid them in serving the needs of their family

Learning Goals

Children in the preschool program explore these concepts, but are not required to master all of them before entering kindergarten. Children learn these concepts at their own pace and are taught with hands-on materials, song, and play-based centers. Parents are asked to reinforce learning goals at home as well.

Religion

- Learn about God's love
- Listen to stories of the life of Jesus
- Learn Jesus' teachings to love God and love others

Math

- Numerals 1-20
- Counting objects to 20
- One-to-one correspondence of objects
- Sorting by various attributes: color, shape, size
- Shapes: square, rectangle, circle, triangle, oval, star, heart, and diamond

Literacy

- Exposure to alphabet: letter names and sounds
- Recognize, spell, and write first name
- Hold a pencil, marker, crayon correctly
- Answer questions about stories

- Build new vocabulary
- Build listening skills

Science

- Explore science tools: magnets, prisms, magnifying glasses, etc.
- Experience the world through nature walks and other explorations
- Observe plant growth
- Observe weather and plant life during each season
- Identify basic colors and explore color mixing
- Explore the world with five senses
- Investigate animals, the homes they live in, the food they eat, etc.

Creative Arts

- Explore a variety of art processes: painting, drawing, collage, print making, etc.
- Use a variety of art materials: crayons, tempera paint, watercolor paint, colored pencils, markers, oil pastels
- Experiment with mixing colors
- Sing traditional songs that enhance the curriculum
- Participate in movement songs and dances
- Use scarves, rhythm sticks, and bean bags to practice rhythms
- Use a variety of children's instruments
- Participate in dramatic play
- Dramatize familiar stories
- Act out the movements and sounds of animals

Social Skills

- Practice problem-solving skills in social situations
- Share classroom materials with a group
- Practice using manners: please, thank you, excuse me, table manners
- Communicate his/her needs
- Take care of his/her own basic needs: clean up, fasten clothing, use tissue as needed, use restroom independently, zip coat, etc.
- State personal information: first and last name, age, school name, city, state, country
- Explore types of work and workers
- Explore modes of transportation
- Participate in projects to help others in need

Technology

- Use a computer mouse: click, click and drag
- Use the internet to explore kid-friendly websites
- Use the Promethean Board during large group and center time

Assessments and Portfolios

We record student progress through the use of assessments. Assessment results will be sent home each quarter. Parent-teacher conferences will be held after the first quarter of the year and when necessary.

Each student will have his/her own portfolio. A portfolio is a binder filled with student work, pictures, and artifacts designed to show student progress and capture some just-for-fun moments throughout the year.

Morning Drop-Off Policy

Preschoolers will be dropped off at a different location than the rest of the school unless otherwise arranged. Preschoolers will enter through Door 11. This is accessed from the parking lot off of N. Washington Avenue (across from church and the bank). The doors will open at 7:35 and close at 7:50. An I.C. staff member will open the doors and greet parents and students.

Parents should walk their student(s) to his/her classroom and sign them in each day but are encouraged to limit time in the building.

After 7:50, students and parents will need to enter through the main school entrance at 6 West State Street.

*On the days that your child's class goes to Mass, you will need to have your child here no later than 7:45 or you may need to bring your child over to church yourself.

Afternoon Pick-Up Policy

Preschool students will be dismissed through the same doors that they enter, Door 11. Parents or whoever is picking your student up should park and wait outside the door. Teachers will watch the cars and meet you at the door with your child. When one of the teachers or aides sees you, your student will be dismissed. If your student goes to aftercare, one of the teachers or aides will walk with them to the cafeteria. There is also the option to have an older sibling pick them up and dismiss with the rest of the school.

*PLEASE let your child's teacher or the school office know if there will be a change to the usual pick up person, place, or time that day. Your child will not be allowed to leave with someone other than a parent without advance **written** notice from the parent.

Before & After Care Programs

Before Care is available from 6:00 am - 7:15 am each day. At 7:15 the students will go to the gym and wait until they are dismissed at 7:35 am with the rest of the students. The students will be provided a light breakfast.

After Care is available from 3:00 pm – 6:00pm each day except for half days. The students will be provided with a light snack.

Please ask the school office or your child's classroom teacher for more information or registration for this program. There is a minimal fee.

Calendar

The Early Childhood Learning Center follows the same calendar as the rest of the school. This includes snow days.

Inclement Weather

On any given day, when the weather is questionable, if by 6:00 A.M. school has not been cancelled or delayed, it will not be. Our day begins at 6:00 A.M. when students can be dropped off at Before Care. From that time on it is impossible for school to close due to the fact that all of our students cannot be picked up.

In the event that the weather makes it difficult to start school on time AND it would be to our advantage to start school later, we call a Delayed Snow Schedule. A School Messenger call will be made before 6:00a.m. to either announce school closure or delayed snow schedule. If you feel it is too dangerous for your family to be traveling, then please call the office to say that you are not coming in. For a Delayed Snow Schedule: School will start at 9:00am. The gym doors will open at 8:30a.m. There will be no Before Care. Families should follow regular drop-off procedures.

PLEASE NOTE: You may, at anytime, pick up your child if the weather is questionable.

Specials

Preschool students get the opportunity to attend "specials" classes once a week. These classes are computers, music, P.E., and library.

Lunch

The preschool teachers eat with the students at child height tables and chairs in the school cafeteria. Your child can either eat buy a school lunch or bring lunch from home. There is also an option to purchase a milk to go with lunch brought from home. Please see the information from the cafeteria about costs of lunches and milks. Microwaves will not be available for use during school lunches.

Snacks

Each class will have a snack time each morning and after nap. Please make sure your child has two snacks each day. Your child's teacher will inform you of how snack works in her classroom.

Student Issues

Attendance & Absence

If your child is going to be absent, please call school before 8:00 A.M. (583-2641)

When a student needs to leave school during the day, a note from home is required. A parent should meet the child in the school office and sign him/her out. If a student is to return to school the same day, he/she must check-in at the office. If your child becomes ill or injured during the school day, you will be notified by the office. The parent, or person designated in case of illness, must sign the child out on the clipboard in the office.

Discipline Policy

Discipline is designed to teach rather than punish. We ask children to show respect for themselves, others, our school, and our world. When disagreements arise, teachers will help children to fix the situation through the use of discussion and redirection. Children need to be able to tell each other how they feel so that they can all begin to develop skills in working in a group and considering the perspective of others. When children are unable to talk to work out a problem, they may be asked to sit out until they are able to return to the group and talk out the problem. Children will only be separated from the activity at hand until they feel they are ready to return. Children are encouraged to think and talk about their feelings during disagreements and to consider what could be done differently in the future.

Actions such as biting are not tolerated. After the first offense, a note will be sent home. After the second offense, there will be a call from the office to discuss a plan. After the third offense, there will be a meeting to determine continued enrollment in the program.

Persistent hitting, kicking, and/or pushing are unacceptable actions. Teachers will notify parents of any inappropriate behaviors. Disciplinary problems that are not corrected by the indicated methods will be discussed with the parents.

We seek to help children to learn how to get along with each other and what behaviors are considerate, thoughtful, and conducive to the functioning of the group. Corporal punishment is never allowed.

Clothing

E.C.L.C. students do not have a school uniform. Children should wear clothing that is comfortable, washable, and suitable for all activities. We go outside almost every day so please make sure that your child is dressed for the weather. We go outside if temperatures are above 20°F and below 100°F.

Children should also wear shoes that allow them to climb, run, and participate in movement activities without causing a potential hazard. NO SANDALS.

NO jewelry except stud earrings. Please make sure girls wear a pair of shorts underneath dresses and skirts. Please no belts as they are difficult for most children to use without assistance.

Please make sure that your child has one complete change of clothes that is kept in their rest buckets at all times. Between accidents, messy activities, and wet playgrounds, every child will probably need to change clothes at some point. You will also need to replace the change of clothes with the seasons.

Toys

No toys should be brought to school other than a stuffed animal for naptime. It can cause disagreements between students and it runs the risk of being misplaced.

Communication

School Messenger

Immaculate Conception uses the School Messenger (automated phone call system) to communicate with families. If a family has not received a School Messenger phone call, please contact the school office at 636-583-2641 to determine why.

Communication between School and Home

Teachers try to keep parents informed of classroom activities through a daily or weekly e-mail to all class parents. Please be sure that your teacher has a working e-mail for you.

A "Friday Folder" will go home each Friday with your child. Inside the folder you will find the school newsletter, *Tiger Tales*, notes from the teacher, and other information from the office. Your child will also have a daily folder he/she will bring home each night. This is used for student work, notes from the teacher, and anything else that may need to go home that day.

Please check your child's backpack for his/her folder each evening and show an interest in your child's work.

Medical Information

Emergency Information

In the case of an emergency, it is very important that each student's file contains accurate contact information for parents and two adults who can act for the parents. In any emergency contact information listed on your child's enrollment form changes, please notify the staff immediately. Immaculate Conception staff will not release any child to an adult who is not listed in the student's emergency record without advance notice from the parents.

Illness

Your child will not be admitted if he or she is ill. This list is the criteria that determine when a child MUST be sent home from preschool. For the protection of all children and staff concerned, you are asked to keep your child home from preschool should any of the following symptoms occurs:

- 1. Diarrhea more than one abnormally loose stool
- 2. Severe coughing if the child gets red or blue in the face and makes high-pitched croupy or whooping sounds after coughing
- 3. Difficult, rapid breathing
- 4. Pink eye tears, redness or eyelid lining, irritation, followed by swelling or discharge of pus
- 5. Unusual spots or rashes
- 6. Sore throat or trouble swallowing
- 7. An infected skin patch or patches crusty, bright yellow, dry, or gummy areas of the skin
- 8. Fever over 100° F by mouth or 99°F under the arm
- 9. Headache or stiff neck
- 10.Vomiting
- 11.Severe itching of the body or scalp, or scratching of the scalp. These may be symptoms of lice or scabies.

School policy dictates that a child must remain home from school for at least 24 hours after they are symptom-free without medication. Thank you for being considerate of the other children with regard to illness. We know you appreciate parents' consideration of your child's health as well.

Medication

Medication brought to school must be brought in an original, current prescription bottle appropriately labeled by the pharmacy with specific instructions from the physician. A medical permission slip from the parents/guardians of the student must accompany this medication giving the school permission to give the medication to the student. All medications will be dispensed through the school office.

School Events

Field Trips

We will plan two field trips during the school year, one in the fall and one in the spring.

We welcome all parents and grandparents to join us on our trips, however, school policy states that no younger siblings are allowed on school sponsored trips. All volunteers are required to complete the Prevent and Protect Program. You will NOT be allowed to go on a field trip in the classrooms unless you have met the requirements.

Student transportation to our field trips will be provided by a bus. Parents who accompany us on field trips may need to carpool depending on the size and space available on the bus. Permission slips will be sent home before each field trip requesting permission for the event.

Parties

We will have holiday parties to celebrate Halloween, Christmas, and Valentine's Day. The room parents who volunteer to assist each classroom are responsible for planning and running the class party. If you wish to be a room parent, sign up at Meet the Teacher in August or contact your child's teacher. Again, please be aware that all volunteers are required to complete the Prevent and Protect Program.

In keeping with our school theme of Respect, Reverence, and Responsibility, it is the policy of the school to respect each child's feelings; therefore, invitations for private parties may be passed out in school ONLY if the entire class is invited. (e.g. all boys, all girls, entire class).

Birthdays

Birthdays are special events in your child's life. Celebrations of birthdays or ½ birthdays should be arranged with your child's teacher in advance of the special day. Parents may send in treats to share with the whole class to celebrate their child's birthday. Treats must be store bought and individually wrapped.

Food at School Functions

Immaculate Conception School will follow the policy of the Archdiocese of St. Louis.

1. Food at parties and other functions in schools should be limited to commercially prepared treats and individually wrapped.

2. Foods prepared at home should not be brought into the classroom for sharing.

3. When providing treats for students, please consider healthy alternatives from the usual sugary snacks.

4. No soda will be allowed for treats, except for Halloween, Christmas, and Valentine's Day parties.

School Volunteers

Volunteer Requirements

School volunteers are interested adults who assist the school where needed. Volunteers are needed for the cafeteria, recess duty, and other areas. All families are required to volunteer (8) eight hours of service each year. Of these eight hours, (2) two hours must be related to the Fall Festival. All parents who volunteer to work with students or go on field trips must complete the "Prevent and Protect" program. They must also read the Code of Ethics manual and sign the signature page. This only has to be done one time, not yearly. The accomplishment of the goals of the parish school is heavily dependent upon the participation of volunteers from the parish, most notable the parents of the school children. The school recognized that individual family situation s result in a variance in any parent's ability to assist in support of the school through volunteer activities. If parents are unable to volunteer, they are required to donate \$150 dollars to help pay someone to fill in over and above their own volunteer time.

Mandated Reporting

As per Missouri law, all personnel working with children or the elderly are designated mandatory reporters. This means that if there are any signs or symptoms of abuse or neglect or a suspicion or abuse or neglect, a report is to be filed.
